Adult Code of Conduct



The Scouting Program is not designed to solve youth discipline problems. On the contrary, it's designed to help build into youth the necessary character and responsibility to prevent discipline problems. The program needs all the time available to it to accomplish these aims. The troop leadership does not have extra time or ability to deal with discipline problems. We believe it is the parents who should have the direct responsibility to instill and reinforce good manners socially acceptable behavior and respect for authority in their Scouts.

- All outings must have two deep leadership.
- Two Scout minimum with each adult.
- You are attending and leading all Scouts, not just your own Scout.
- Do not expect to have all activities with your Scout.
- If you are attending an event, you must meet and discuss travel, event plans and food before the outing (PLC).
- You are encouraged to bring disciplinary issues to a Scoutmaster unless an emergency or safety infraction is about to occur.
- All matters of discipline should be discussed with a Scoutmaster afterwards.
- Adults are not allowed to give their Scout extra money if there is a limit.
- Adults may not enter Scout tents. Scouts may not enter Adult tents.
- The use of profanity or abusive language will not be tolerated.
- Adult electronics are for Adult use only. Remember, Scouting is an outdoor activity and tries to reduce use of electronics.
- This is a Scout outing and as such, you and your Scout may not leave any outing without permission of a Scoutmaster.
- Notice that photos/videos may be taken by other members of the troop.
- For safety and privacy reasons, photos/videos taken should not be labeled with full names.
- No alcohol or tobacco use at Scouting events.
- See reverse Code of Conduct. Adults should be good examples for the Scouts and follow the same core rules.

Finally, for Adults to participate in any scouting events, all Adults must be an active, registered leader with Scouting America and associated with BSA Troop 167. Additionally, Adults must have a current, completed Youth Protection certificate on file with the Troop.
